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

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
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

**DETAILS**

UN Secretary General's Special Envoy for Global Education and former Prime Minister of UK Mr. Gordon Brown called on Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif in New York today (Friday) to discuss issues pertaining to mutual cooperation for the promotion of education in Pakistan. Gordon Brown admired Prime Minister for accorded priority to education in Pakistan. Recalling his earlier visit to Islamabad and meeting with the Prime Minister, the Envoy told that his Office was ready to raise funds for a new project to increase literacy and improve education in Pakistan. Global partners including US, EU, UAE, Qatar and Global Partnership for Education had committed millions of dollars for this purpose. The centerpiece of this strategy would be to incentivize literacy at the district and community levels. Poor families sending their children to school would receive help under a cash transfer scheme. The Envoy indicated that donors were willing to increase funding depending on the results of the scheme. IMF could also be approached to relax terms for financing of education sector in Pakistan. He noted that only fifteen months were left to achieving Millennium Development Goals on education and governments would have to redouble efforts to pull off extraordinary results in this short period. Convening of a donor conference could also be considered to seek additional funds for education in Pakistan from the potential donors.

Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif welcomed Gordon Brown's proposal and appreciated his efforts for promotion of education in Pakistan. The Prime Minister told that he would personally discuss the proposal with the Chief Ministers of the provinces, who were very receptive to any cooperation in the field of education in line with government's priority. The Prime Minister added that education was a top priority for his Government as reflected in Vision-2025. The Government had raised allocation for education to 2% of GDP and he was committed to take it to 4% of GDP by 2018. Government's first priority was to achieve 100% enrolment. This required incentives to poor families to encourage them to send their children to school. The proposed fund would be utilized for incentivizing education at the district and community level. Release of funds would be conditional upon amatching increase in district budgets by the concerned provinces and a 10% increase in enrolments. He assured the Envoy that the funds would be utilized strictly for the purpose of education under a transparent and tangible plan for maximum results. The two leaders also exchanged views on other issues of mutual interest including ongoing military operation against terrorists, floods in Pakistan, and the recent referendum in Scotland.

Pop icon Madonna took to Instagram on Monday to announce the opening of her 'dream school' in Karachi that she pledged to help build last year. "The Revolution of Love continues in Pakistan! The Dream School is finally finished. 1,200 kids attending. Knowledge is Power! #rayoflight #livingforlove," read her caption. Last year, Madonna announced that she is raising money to expand a school in an impoverished area on the outskirts of Karachi, according to a press release on her official website. The starlet went on stage at a live concert in London and publicised that she is supporting girls' education in Pakistan through her Ray of Light Foundation, and urged people to support her cause. She was joined on stage by Humaira Bachal, an education activist from Karachi. Madonna has long spoken about her admiration for Humaira Bachal, a Pakistani woman who has campaigned for better education for young girls. Speaking at the Chime For Change event in London last year, Madonna said, "Let's help Humaira build a bigger school in Pakistan! How 'bout this? You build the first floor, I'll build the rest of the school. Let's do this together!" The Dream Model Street School is located in Mawach Goth, Karachi and was founded by the Dream Foundation Trust (DFT), a Pakistani non-governmental organisation. The school, established in 2005, and claims to have taught over 2,000 students who otherwise would not have had access to education. "I want to trade something valuable for something invaluable – educating girls," she said in a statement.

Succumbing to pressure of its key coalition partner in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Jamaat-e-Islami, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf government has decided in principle to remove 'objectionable material' from the textbooks of local primary schools, local media reports said on Saturday. A senior official of the KP Education Department said that JI leaders had voiced reservations about the printing of pictures of minor girls without dupattas, Christmas cake and a Cross emblem on an ambulance instead of Crescent, the mention of good morning instead of Assalamu Aliakum, and presence of some other 'objectionable' stuff in textbooks for primary schools. "JI leaders have complained about minor things in textbooks, whose removal has been decided in principle," the official said, requesting anonymity. He said JI had demanded replacement of the expression 'good morning' with Assalamu Aliakum and the government was quick to accept it.

Ji provincial spokesman Israrullah said his party had serious reservations about certain contents of textbooks but 'objectionable' stuff had been removed after Elementary and Secondary Education Minister Atif Khan met party leaders on Wednesday. "Officials of the department concerned and textbook board have formally agreed to remove objectionable contents from textbooks and will induct material to be proposed by Jamaat," he said. The meeting held in Peshawar on Wednesday was attended by Education Minister Atif Khan, Additional Secretary Education Qaisar Alam, chairman of the textbook board Jamal Nasir and other senior officers.

Jamaat-e-Islami was represented by local government minister Inayatullah Khan, head of the JI education committee Mirajuddin and other members of the party. "Jamaat is now satisfied with the government's assurances and hopes minutes of the meeting with the minister will be implemented in letter and spirit," Israrullah said, adding that the revised syllabus would conform to Islamic teachings and the ideology of Pakistan. JI had recently protested the presence of objectionable material in textbooks and even threatened to quit the PTI-led government over it. JI provincial chief Professor Mohammad Ibrahim had stated early this month that his party had not been taken into confidence before preparation of syllabus for primary schools. He had complained that the

provincial government has removed lessons on the life of Holy Prophet Mohammad (Peace Be upon Him), His wives and four caliphs of Muslims from textbooks and inducted contents about Ranjit Singh, Raja Dahir, and Khan Abdul Ghaffar Khan.

Jl claimed that it had signed an agreement with its senior coalition partner in which it was decided that the controversial contents of textbooks by the previous government would be removed and that the new syllabus would be designed with the JI consultation. The spokesman said the material related with teaching of Islam, Prophet Mohammad (PBUH) and important Muslim personalities, including Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah, would again be included in textbooks. He said the India-occupied Kashmir was not shown as part of Pakistan in the map printed in textbooks, while lessons about Quaid-e-Azam were also removed from textbooks designed for children. He said induction of lesson about Khan Abdul Ghaffar was not a big issue. The government official said the objection over Khan Abdul Ghaffar Khan was turned down and JI leaders were convinced that like Abdul Ghaffar Khan, every politician was controversial. He said the map incorporated in the Survey of Pakistan had been reproduced in the textbooks.

**KARACHI:** The Minister of State for Education and Professional Training Muhammad Baligh Ur Rehman has said that government was determined to achieve its vision towards a vibrant education system in Pakistan. The Minister said that it was difficult for the present government to achieve to Millennium Development Goals (MDG) pertaining to ensuring that children everywhere, boys and girls alike, will be able to complete a full course of primary schooling by 2015. However, every possible effort is being made by the present government under its Vision 2025 to achieve this goal, he added while talking at a meeting during his visit to the Karachi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) on Thursday.

The Minister further informed that it was a matter of grave concern that around 15 million children in Pakistan are not going to schools whereas the dropout rate clearly indicates that one-third of the total children going to school dropout due to various reasons. The government is thoroughly examining the causes of this substantial dropout and devising steps accordingly to effectively deal with the situation, he added. Speaking on the occasion, Vice Chairman Businessmen Group & Former President KCCI, Anjum Nisar termed poor education system as 'the biggest issue' being faced by Pakistan which has resulted in creating other issues including poverty, unemployment, energy crisis, protests and sit-in etc. Earlier, President KCCI Abdullah Zaki, while welcoming the Minister, expressed deep concerns over poor standards of education in Pakistan as compared to countries around the world. In this regard, he underscored the need to introduce across-the-board reforms in the education sector to improve the low literacy rate of the country.

Former President KCCI, A. Q. Khalil suggested that in order to create a better society, the school curriculums across Pakistan must carry subjects on traffic and civic sense in order to raise awareness amongst masses from the grass root level. Chairman Health, Education & CSR Sub-Committee KCCI, Anis Haji Younus Arfa pointed out that double standards of education in Pakistan have terribly affected the education environment of the country which needs to be addressed on priority by strictly implementing universal standard of education in all the private and public schools across Pakistan.

**Punjab govt passing the 'tough test' by eliminating it**

**LAHORE:** Compromising the uniformity of standards in medical education, the Punjab government has allegedly acted "beyond its domain" against a federal institution's guidelines by forming a committee to end entry test for admissions in medical colleges. Punjab Chief Minister Shahbaz Sharif has constituted Examination and Admission Reforms Committee which has recommended ending entry test after intermediate examination for admission in medical colleges and other professional institutions. The chief minister, after holding "public parley" about entry test, will give a final decision in this regard. As per a government's spokesperson, the meeting was chaired by Punjab Education Minister Rana Mashhood Ahmed Khan in which majority of the participants were of the view that male and female students belonging to urban and rural areas of the province should be provided level playing field for getting admission in professional colleges and universities. Addressing the meeting, Mashhood said that 20 years ago, when entry test was introduced, "booti mafia" was very active in various educational boards of the province and the performance of educational boards was a big question mark. However, during the last six years, the Punjab government has taken "effective steps", as a result of which eight educational boards of the province have been made much transparent. However, Law Department officials said that the decision will now move from the Higher Education Department (HED) to the Health Department and will end up at the Law Department for vetting before finally arriving at the chief minister's for approval. "The government acted beyond its ambit by formulating a committee on something which is under the purview of the federal government. The PMDC already exists and it has clearly laid out rules that entry tests should be held before examinations in all provinces. If one province moves out of the league, there will be no uniformity of standards in the medical education," the official added.

The head of a medical institution, on anonymity, told this scribe that it is a move to "kill merit" in the province. The minister might claim of having bringing all educational boards at par with the standards of transparency however, it is far from truth, he claimed. "In recent years, the heads of various boards have been sacked for various glitches in the online system which caused a lot of trouble to the students and parents and caused embarrassment for the government. Also there is no way to check if the so called 'booti mafia' has ended which will definitely crop up once the old system is revived," the head added. Young Doctors' Association (YDA)'s Dr Salman Kazmi commented on the issue saying that in the developed and the developing world including the US, India and UK, the entry test is mandatory.

"We have also started a poll on our facebook page and 90 percent of people have opposed the move. The merits and demerits of having an entry test system are besides the point here,

because a provincial government committee cannot possibly rule on something directly under the federal ambit. The procedures have been violated and I am sure the Law Department will raise this point too," Kazmi added. However, HED Secretary Abdullah Sumbal said that the government has just taken a first step in reviewing something which was "initiated by itself". "There is no harm reviewing things from time to time for betterment." To a question, Sumbal said that Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PMDC) was invited but its officials did not participate in the meeting despite the importance of the matter. "After the 18th Amendment the provinces have full right to make their own decisions," he said, adding that it will pass through two more stages at least before reaching the CM for approval

**PESHAWAR:** Australia-based Pakistani youth have planned to promote peace through education in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and in this connection they are setting up the first school of their project in Peshawar in March for imparting quality education to the children whose parents couldn't afford it. With the help of their other partners they also plan to open more schools in KP and other parts of the country. Young Pakistan Association of Australia (YPA) has joined hands with Peshawar Youth Organisation (PYO) for the promotion of peace through education and they have resolved to provide quality education to socially and economically disadvantaged children of the conflict-ravaged Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Housed in a rented building in Gulbahar locality here, the association will launch its maiden project with a school which will have linkages with Australian schools through internet that will prove a landmark for the local students, who will benefit for incurring no cost. Classes would commence from March 15 and around 200 children would be admitted in the first batch. Pakistani Consul-General in Sydney, YPA and Raising Hope Education Foundation are the partners of the project.

Slogan of these young Pakistanis is "Learning in unity today, leading in harmony tomorrow," who believe that KP has been ravaged by conflict and violence. Inauguration ceremony of the project was held here on Saturday, which was attended by members of the associations, students, parents, parliamentary leader of Awami National Party Sardar Hussain Babak and Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf MPA Zareen Zia.

Ironically, minister for elementary and secondary education Mohammad Atif and officials of his department were absent from the function. "Representatives of the government might have no time to spare from their sit-in in Islamabad to attend this function. The government accorded priority to the sit-in," said an organiser of the function while expressing his displeasure over the absence of the education department officials. The moving spirit behind this ambitious project is an Australian Francis Ventura, who is coordinator of the programme and volunteered himself for the plan. "Establishment of the school will be a turning point in the history of Peshawar and will prove a game changer for the city," he said while speaking on the occasion.

"We are delighted at the support we have been getting from PYO to promote peace through education that encourages interfaith harmony, empowers girls, and builds connections between the people of Pakistan and Australia," he remarked. He said that if more young people in the region could receive a good education, goals such as gender equality and social cohesion – critical pillars of peace and development – stand a better chance of being achieved. Assistant country director of The Peshawar School for Peace Syeda Aleina Shah said that aim of the programme was to provide opportunity of quality education to those children who could not afford international standard education. She said that special syllabus had been designed for the school, which had been divided into two parts. "First part of the curricula comprises seven basic subjects being taught to children across the country. The second part comprises extra curricula through which skill of leadership, career counselling, behavioural sciences and other subjects," she said, adding that schools in KP would be connected with institutions in Australia. She said that five schools would be established in different districts of KP by end of 2016 and more branches would be opened in other districts of the province by end of 2017. She said the programme would be extended to Balochistan after covering KP. Mr Babak said that militants had targeted education sector during the last few years and hundreds of schools and other education institutions were destroyed in KP and Fata. He assured full support of his party to the organisers of the programme.

**Education and the gender gap: Female literacy rate in villages is near zero, says Gazdar**

**KARACHI:** The literacy rate for women is zero in a number of villages across Sindh, claimed social scientist Haris Gazdar at a public lecture organised by the Yohsin Centre for Social Development at Habib University on Thursday. Gazdar, who works on political economy and development policy issues, was addressing more than 100 students, academics, researchers and intellectuals regarding women's education and the gender gap in literacy at the Tariq Rafi lecture theatre.

"The global literacy gap for women is said to be 45 per cent but for Muslim women, the number almost doubles, standing at 86 per cent," said Gazdar. Talking about the prevailing educational crisis in the country, he also highlighted the differences between the individual and the society.

"People in the villages fight with each other about petty issues and refuse to send their children, especially their daughters, to schools belonging to other communities," he said, explaining the reasons behind Pakistan's failure in promoting education. "It is necessary for everyone to understand that education is beyond community or caste; it is the only way Pakistan can prosper."

Sharing his views on why the female literacy rate in villages was nearly non-existent, Gazdar said that the problem was one of perception rather than resources. He added that both the government and the public needed to understand the importance of educating females. "Jinnah was very keen to educate the women of Pakistan, and made comparisons between the education policies of India and China after just three months of independence," said Gazdar, referring to the All-Pakistan Educational Conference held in November 1947 in Karachi. "The 18th Amendment gives

every Pakistani child in the age bracket of five to 16 years the right to free education," asserted Gazdar. "But saying this in the media over and over again does not change the fact that our literacy rate has barely changed in the last five years." Answering a question about the decentralised education system in the country, Gazdar clarified that Pakistan had come a long way in the last decade. "Our younger generation is more literate and knowledgeable than we were at their age," he said. The audience interacted with the speaker through a question and answer session that touched upon several areas such as national identity, the Western model of education and the educational implications of the 18th Amendment.

**BAHAWALPUR:** "The government wants to overcome flaws in the educational system. A uniform education system would benefit the entire country," said Federal Minister for Education Mian Balighur Rehman. He said the government was mulling putting a ban on teachers transfers. He said 80,000 teachers had been appointed to meet a shortage of educators. He was addressing a seminar organised by the SPARC. He said on October 15, an action plan to improve education will be provided to the provinces.

Bahawalpur Islamia University Vice Chancellor Saleem Tariq Khan said in his address that the SPARC had undertaken an initiative to highlight problems in rural areas. He said teachers formed the backbone of the education sector. "Our education system is based on a colonial apparatus," he said. "We cannot match European standards of education with such scarce resources." SPARC founder Anees Jillani said Pakistan would not prosper without a sustainable education policy. He said Pakistan was lagging behind in research. "It is also commonly known that public schools lack basic facilities," he said. "This has a drastic impact on the quality of education our children get." He said elected representatives of the people should send their children to public schools to set an example. "This is the only way the government would understand the gravity of our education problem." MNA Sabiha Nazeer said the government was taking steps to provide missing facilities at campuses. She said the Punjab government had built boundary walls, toilets and classrooms. MPA Syed Wasim Akhtar said that government departments should specialise in their respective fields. "When an officer from the Agriculture Department is made head of the Education Department, how can we expect consistent outcomes?" A presentation on research on comparison between public and private schools was also shown to participants.

### Right to education: K-P govt urged to implement Article 25-A

**PESHAWAR:** The K-P government was asked to implement Article 25-A, the Right to Education, which was introduced in the 18th Amendment. This was said on Thursday at a seminar organised by Working Group for Girls Education and Initiative (WGGEI), in collaboration with SPARC and ActionAid Pakistan. SPARC Project Manager Jahanzeb Khan said the objective of the consultative seminar was to improve coordination between likeminded organisations on a divisional and provincial level by developing a clear understanding of Article 25-A. The Right to Free and Compulsory Education Bill was being drafted for K-P, said Jahanzeb. According to Jahanzeb, if the bill becomes legislation, children of the province, between the ages of five and 16, will be eligible for free and compulsory education. UoP Department of Sociology Chairman Prof Dr Niaz Khan said a lack of access to schools and a lack of awareness among young parents are the two main reasons behind low enrolment in institutions. He stressed sustainable development was needed for better policies and improvements on the individual and institutional levels. Niaz pointed out according to Article 37-B the 1973 Constitution, education is free and compulsory up to the secondary level and it was the prime responsibility of the state to implement this law. "The recipe for an effective education system requires access, the provision of facilities, curriculum and teachers as its key ingredients," said Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz MPA Amina Sardar.

### Japan provides US\$ 171,920 for education, health projects

**ISLAMABAD:** The Government of Japan has provided US\$ 171,920 approximately Rs. 17 million to two Pakistani NGOs for the improvement of education and health sectors in the country. Japan has provided US\$ 101,260 to Learning Awareness and Motivation Program (LAMP) and US\$ 70,660 to True Worth Foundation for the improvement of educational and health facilities in disadvantaged areas of the country. The agreements for the two projects were signed here on Thursday between Ambassador of Japan to Pakistan, Hiroshi Inomata and the heads of the two organizations. The grant to LAMP will be utilized for the construction of a primary school in Village Lashora of the Khyber Agency (FATA). It is expected that more than 170 students who are currently studying in open-air classes would be able to learn in a newly-built school building. The grant to True Worth Foundation on the other hand will be utilized for the improvement of the organization's health centre in Chatta Bakhtawar, Islamabad, including the provision of an ambulance, establishment of a laboratory and the general upgrading of facilities. It is estimated that approximately 5,400 people from the underdeveloped outskirts of Islamabad will benefit from this project every year. Speaking on the occasion, Ambassador Inomata said that Japan's Official Development Assistance Programme to Pakistan confers a high priority to the improvement of educational and health facilities in the country. He expressed his hope that these interventions would contribute to Pakistan's goals of providing equal opportunities for good quality education as well as improving access to health care facilities, and in doing so would certainly strengthen the friendly relations between the people of Japan and Pakistan.

### Private institutions playing pivotal role in providing quality education: Mujtaba Shuja

**LAHORE:** Private educational institutions are playing a pivotal role in providing quality education and government highly appreciates the services of private sector for the enhancement of literacy rate, said Punjab Minister for Excise, Taxation and Finance Mujtaba Shujaur Rehman while addressing inauguration of a private management institute on Saturday. Shuja told that provision of the education is constitutional obligation of the government, but government cannot do this duty single handedly, and requires the support of private sector in this regard. It is encouraging that private schools are providing standardised education and presence of quality school is a healthy sign for the education system of the country. He said that scholarships of 12 billion rupees are being provided to more than 50 thousand students within the country and abroad from endowment

fund and students of private education institutions are also benefiting from this fund. He said that the government considers private schools active partner in the struggle of promotion of education in the country and Rs 7.50 billion to the Punjab Education Foundation for grant to the private schools as fifteen hundred thousand students are getting education in private schools. The minister said that the Punjab government is pursuing a comprehensive policy for the promotion and up-gradation of school education and Rs 8 billion have been provided for the provision of missing facilities in all schools in the province. He said that Rs 3.63 billion has been provided for the distribution of free of cost textbooks to the students. He said that IT labs had been set up in more than 5000 high schools and 515 middle schools. He said that Rs 2.40 billion has been provided for provision of non-formal basic education to two million illiterate people.

**BANNU:** Continuing military operations in Pakistan's North Waziristan tribal district are disrupting the education of more than 85,000 students in state-run schools. According to the latest report from the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), as of the 1 September, 1,016,559 people are registered as displaced from North Waziristan, around 45 percent of them children. "What would be their future without education and who should we ask for help?" father-of-three Ashraf Wazir, a displaced resident of Miramshah town in North Waziristan, told IRIN, saying that his children had been withdrawn from school in the middle of the previous academic year. The number of enrolled students in government schools in North Waziristan was 86,323, an official at the Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA) Secretariat in Peshawar, requesting anonymity, told IRIN, adding that 50,429 of them were primary school children. Data on those in private schools in North Waziristan could not be obtained. The Pakistan military says it has now cleared militant groups from most parts of North Waziristan, but tribal elders say the government has not yet taken steps to allow people to return, something that has caused protests by displaced students from schools and colleges in North Waziristan. "We, the students, are [the] worst victims among the displaced people," said Ejazul Haq, a college student, who led the protest in Bannu on 28 August. Haq said the college students have had difficulty preparing for their annual examinations which are due next month. The military launched Operation Zarb-e-Azab on 15 June against Taliban militant groups in North Waziristan.

During a visit to a camp for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the Bakakhel area of Bannu Frontier Region on 6 September Pakistani Army Chief Gen Raheel Sharif said North Waziristan IDPs would be allowed to return their homes soon, according to Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), the media wing of the Pakistani military. Pakistan is a signatory to the Convention on the Rights of the Child and has also committed to the Education for All and Millennium Development Goals, under which it aspires to place every girl and boy in school by 2015. However, education activists say, the literacy rate in FATA is lower than all other parts of the country mainly because of Taliban militancy and resulting displacement. The rate in North Waziristan is 15.7 percent, including 26.9 percent among men and 1.5 per cent among women, according to statistics shared by the official at the FATA Secretariat.

**Enrolling the displaced**

The provincial authorities in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province (KP), where many of the displaced have fled, have decided to admit all school- and college-going displaced youths in local schools and colleges, according to Mushtaq Ahmed Ghani, provincial minister for higher education. The provincial education department published advertisements in local Urdu newspapers on 1 September encouraging displaced families from North Waziristan to enrol. It said formal documents or school certificates would not be mandatory for admission. "Every student will also receive 2,000 Pakistan rupees (US\$200) monthly," Ghani told IRIN. KP is already running a campaign to pay a stipend of 200 Pakistani rupees (\$20) per month to increase the school enrolment rate. Schools in KP reopened on 1 September at the end of the three-month summer vacation. The authorities have been arranging alternative accommodation for IDPs who were given shelter in state-run schools in KP districts adjacent to North Waziristan. An estimated 460 school buildings in the province were occupied by North Waziristan IDPs, media reports suggest. However, a number of displaced families have refused to vacate the schools. "We would never reside in the camps because of our social and cultural norms," said Haji Akbar, 45, a resident of Mir Ali, who is living in a government school in Bannu with his extended 25-member family, 18 of them women and children. They occupy four of the school's 20 rooms. "It is considered against Pashtun norms and values to live with women in a tent," Akbar told IRIN.

**Humanitarian response**

A number of UN agencies and local NGOs are also setting up informal schools for the displaced children of North Waziristan. The UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) in collaboration with the provincial education department will support the education of 9,000 IDP children (including 4,500 girls) in IDP hosting districts of the province, said a UNICEF spokesperson; 1,334 displaced children, including 513 girls, have been identified and enrolled in 16 nearby government schools, and government teachers from North Waziristan have been deployed to serve in these schools. North Waziristan's political authorities have also directed all displaced government teachers to start teaching at schools in different KP districts, especially in Bannu. BEFARE, a UNICEF NGO partner, is conducting needs assessments among IDPs and encouraging parents to send their children to schools. Educational supplies, including 27 tents and student learning kits have reached Bannu for supporting Temporary Learning Centres (TLCs). Local organizations have also been active. The Initiative for Social Transformation (IST), an NGO, has set up several TLCs for IDP children in rural areas of Bannu and other districts for KP, said IST's Nizam Dawar, adding that the organization has been working closely with a 67-member committee consisting of tribal elders from different North Waziristan clans. However, IDPs are not enrolling their children in schools in Bannu and other districts of KP as they are still optimistic about early repatriation. "We have been living temporarily here and after [a] few weeks or months, we have to go back to our

hometown. So why should we enrol our children in local schools," asked Zar Wali, a resident of Mir Ali and father of six.

#### Pakistan students in Afghanistan

Not all families displaced by recent fighting remained in the country, with thousands crossing over into neighbouring Afghanistan. "The families especially who were living close to the border had opted to leave for bordering provinces of Afghanistan, especially Khost Province, because of difficulties in transportation and prolonged curfew in North Waziristan," said Malik Ghulam Khan Madakhel, a North Waziristan tribal elder. According to the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR), more than 75,000 people fleeing from conflict in North Waziristan have migrated to Afghanistan's Khost and Paktika provinces. However, a number of displaced families who initially fled to Afghanistan have since crossed back into Pakistan via the Kurram Agency, a tribal district adjacent to North Waziristan and Khost Province. Registration of North Waziristan IDPs has been closed in Bannu and Peshawar districts; however, the registration exercise is ongoing at the Ali Zai checkpoint in Kurram Agency for those families returning from Afghanistan, according to OCHA's latest report. In an official meeting led by Khost governor Abdul Jabbar Naeemi and also attended by UNHCR and NGOs on 3 September, it was decided that North Waziristan IDP children would be admitted to local schools to save their academic year. Mubarez Zardan, an official in Khost's provincial education department, said the Khost governor had asked for 80 informal schools to be opened for refugee families in Khost's Gullan area, where the Afghan authorities have set up camps for Pakistanis. "Pakistani teachers from North Waziristan, who also migrated to different parts of Khost Province, will teach displaced children and Afghan authorities would pay them," Mubarez told IRIN in a telephone interview.

**KARACHI:** As compared to other countries in the South Asian region, Pakistan fares poorly with the youth literacy at a mere 70.7 percent.

Maldives boasts an impressive 99.3 percent youth literacy, followed by Sri Lanka (98.2 percent), Nepal (82.4 percent), India (81.1 percent), Bangladesh (78.7 percent) and Bhutan (74.4 percent). As Pakistan marks World Literacy Day 2014 today, investment and focus on education remains alarmingly low, says the campaign director of Alif Ailaan Mosharrif Zaidi. While the country goes through a political crisis of transition, education has once again taken a back seat, falling low on the list of political priorities. Currently, Pakistan's literacy rate stands at 60 percent. However, according to the definition of literacy used in Pakistan, a person who can merely sign their name is considered to be literate. Zaidi said that as such, official literacy rates did not provide an accurate measure of reading and writing ability among the population. "Literacy is the ability to read and write, and the way it is measured in Pakistan is very, very limited," he added. "Even, we have one of the world's lowest literacy rates. Year after year we lament this fact. Yet our progress has been painfully slow. We are shamelessly allowing illiteracy to continue in this country. Where is the protest against this abomination?" Zaidi questioned. Male literacy in Pakistan stands at 71 percent but female literacy is just 48 percent. "This gender disparity needs to be addressed on an emergency footing," he mentioned while quoting Pakistan Bureau of Statistics report. Equally distressing are the figures for literacy among young people aged 15-24. "Pakistan's fabled demographic dividend will amount to very little if public policy does not urgently begin to address the massive gap in quality education for our children," Zaidi said. "No amount of income support programmes, or youth loans can cover up the desperate lack of confidence and capacity in our young people. Pakistan owes its children and youth a better deal than this," he said.

With 25 million children out of school, the crisis continues to worsen. "While it is critically important to ensure that no Pakistani child is out of school, it is equally important to improve the quality of education on offer in our schools," he advised. "Without more effective teachers and better learning outcomes, Pakistan will continue to produce 'literate' individuals lacking the basic skills necessary to be productive citizens," Zaidi observed. Currently, the net enrolment rate in primary schools across the country is as low as 56 percent, meaning that nearly half of all children who should begin school fail to do so. The enrolment falls further at subsequent levels of education, with middle school enrolment at 20 percent and high school enrolment at just 12 percent. "This means that even among those children who do enrol in school, the majority fail to complete their education," he claimed. "Despite commitments from all major political parties to fix Pakistan's broken education system, there is a long way to go before the country is able to provide quality education for all."

**KARACHI:** The Sindh High Court (SHC) gave last chance to the education and literacy department secretary, director education and other officials to respond on a petition of a Sindhi language teacher seeking payment of salaries. The petitioner, Zulifqar Ali, approached the court citing education and literacy department secretary, director education Karachi and accountant general (AG) Sindh as respondents. In the petition, Zulifqar submitted that he was appointed at Government Boys Secondary School (GBSS), Bhitai Colony, Korangi Crossing, Karachi, in May 1999 but since then he was not paid salary by the AG. Back in 1999, appointments of Sindhi language and junior school teachers made during 1998 and 1999 were declared bogus by the AG who did not release their salaries but Sindh Service Tribunal declared their appointments valid in July 2007 after being approached them, said the petitioner. He submitted that following the judgment of the tribunal, not only did the education department regularize their services from date of their appointments but also ordered release of their salaries from July 2010 onward. The petitioner said that all his school colleagues, who were regularized along with him, were drawing their salaries but he was not being paid salaries by the AG despite the fact that he had got his salary bills approved from the education department, he added. The petitioner requested the court to order official respondents to release his salaries. When the matter came up for hearing, a division bench headed by Justice Hassan Azhar Rizvi expressed displeasure on official



### HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISSION (HEC)

#### Commission Meeting: HEC To Auction Testing Services Afresh

**ISLAMABAD:** The Higher Education Commission (HEC) will hire services of a new testing body for admission into varsities and scholarship awards through open bidding. National Testing Service, a private body, has been conducting entry tests of universities, but earlier this year, the Lahore High Court ordered the HEC to form a body of its own or assign the task to a new body after open bidding. Galvanised into action after being reprimanded by the Senate Standing Committee on Education and Training, the HEC held its governing body's meeting on Friday after a record 17 months. The commission has been citing unavailability of the members for multiple postponements.

The governing board running the HEC consists of 18 members — two federal secretaries, four representatives of the provinces, an executive director, one vice chancellor and 10 nominees of the prime minister. Meetings of the HEC's commission or governing body are held to take policy decisions about higher education in the country. The 18-member commission is currently short of nine members. The last time the HEC governing body had met was in April 2013. It postponed three scheduled meetings, the latest of which was supposed to be held on April 7, 2014, before the board finally met on 26<sup>th</sup> Sep, 2014. The commission discussed the higher education sector in the post-18th Amendment scenario. Participants agreed that wide consultations should be carried out with the provinces to ensure that activities undertaken by provinces are in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution of Pakistan, especially articles 153 and 154. HEC Chairman Dr Mukhtar Ahmad said that a series of meetings will be held with provinces after Eid. The meeting approved revised budget estimates for the financial years 2012-13 and 2013-14 and budget estimate for 2014-15. The HEC chairman appreciated the government regarding the highest-ever allocation Rs18 billion for higher education in the current budget.

The commission, under section 10 of the HEC Ordinance, also decided to select a new testing body through a competitive process. The Commission authorised HEC chairman to constitute a sub-committee of the commission including technical members with expertise in assessment and testing services to review and prescribe a regulatory and statutory framework for monitoring and quality assurance of such a testing service. The members also reviewed and approved the scope of National Technology Council in terms of programmes and disciplines falling under the purview of the council. The commission also ratified the minutes of the selection board meeting held on July 16, 2014, with minor observations. It also confirmed a few appointments made on deputation basis. The governing body directed that all vacant positions should be advertised.

#### HEC to Expand COOP with AIT

**ISLAMABAD:** Professor Mukhtar Ahmed, Chairman of the Higher Education Commission (HEC) of Pakistan, has expressed the desire to expand ties with the Asian Institute of Technology (AIT), and offered to host a visit by the AIT President for strategic discussions with counterparts in Pakistan. He was speaking at a high-level HEC-AIT meeting hosted by the Pakistan Embassy in Bangkok, said a message received here on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> Sep, 2014. AIT President Worsak Kanok-Nukulchai was joined at the meeting by Professor Emeritus Dr. Sahas Bunditkul, Chairman of the Executive Committee. "AIT is our priority," and the renewal of the existing memorandum of understanding presents an opportunity for building on the mutually beneficial relationship, the HEC chairman said. Prof. Mukhtar added that he was proud to be an honorary member of the AIT Alumni Association, and remains confident of AIT's continuing and prominent role in Pakistan's human development. "We reconfirm our fullest commitment to AIT. We feel it is our own institution."

He also informed the AIT delegation about the Pakistan Government's ambitious US\$ 5 billion initiative to expand the country's higher education infrastructure, including efforts to double the number of PhDs graduating each year to 1000. President Worsak welcomed HEC's continuing engagement with AIT, saying the institute is keen to accept more Pakistani students, and also seconded faculty. The president also pointed out how the institute benefits from scholarships provided by valued partners such as Pakistan, and would like to expand cooperation possibilities within HEC's plans. Prof. Mukhtar noted that reliance on government funding for higher education is no longer the sole option, referring to how universities in Pakistan are being encouraged to build up R&D capacity and industry linkages to generate revenue for upgrading technology, digital resources, and the quality of faculty research. Nowadays, students can also choose from a vast array of subjects and institutions, and top students have high demands from faculty and learning environments. HEC aims to work closely with AIT in meeting such expectations, the HEC chairman said. Prof. Mukhtar added that Pakistan was reviewing the retirement age to enable faculty to remain productive longer. "We can share our experience too and even facilitate discussions that might be useful for AIT." It was agreed that AIT would respond to the current draft MOU, and share a draft outline of seconded faculty exchange modalities for review and confirmation by HEC. Engagement could also include increased interaction with leading universities in Pakistan to explore areas where AIT can have more meaningful strategic exchanges, including split degree programs, joint professorships, and research collaboration in Water Resources, Energy, Food Security and Environmental Management. AIT possesses expertise to share with Pakistani universities in fields such as Aquaculture, GIS, and Food Processing, and could benefit from exposure to research opportunities in Pakistan in the social sciences, officials said. Dr. Sohail Khan, Ambassador of Pakistan to Thailand supported the view that apart from the scholarship support HEC was considering for AIT, there is opportunity for greater faculty exchange and research linkages. He invited AIT to share its procedure for inviting seconded overseas faculty, and expressed a desire to establish modalities for Pakistan. Ambassador Khan confirmed the Embassy of Pakistan's

## PAKISTAN MEDICAL AND DENTAL COUNCIL (PMDC)

### Pmdc Joins Hands With Hec, Cpsp For Accreditation

**ISLAMABAD:** Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PMDC) has joined hands with Higher Education Commission (HEC) and College of Physicians and Surgeons Pakistan (CPSP) for the accreditation of post graduate medical education in the country. All the vice chancellors and principals of medical post graduate medical institutions alongwith stakeholders of the HEC and CPSP participated in the meeting. The meeting chaired by President PMDC Prof. Dr. Masood Hameed Khan was decided that universities in future will not deliver any medical program under graduates or postgraduates without having constituted medical college. Any inspection of medical colleges will be conducted only when their inspection will be due while examination of colleges will be conducted every year for five years. It was decided that the PMDC postgraduate curriculum standard setting will be enhanced and minimum requirements for training institutions will be refreshed. Later talking to media persons, President PMDC Prof. Dr. Masood apprised that the council has established a specialty board to have a complete check on the doctors who are working in those specialties which they are not qualified particularly hair-transplant and liposuction.

He added PMDC strictly disallowed doctors from treating patients who don't acquire relevant specialization. He said all the doctors have been directed to get their additional qualifications registered with PMDC before carrying out any procedures like hair transplant, liposuction, constructive surgeries etc. He said PMDC is empowered to establish this board under section 16 C1 and C2. The main purpose of this specialty board will be to collect and maintain a database of doctors who have specialized in one specialty but are working in other specialties without any certification.

Continuous medical education will also be the responsibility of specialty board besides post fellowship. The specialty board will also define the level of competency of doctors. Acting Registrar PMDC, Dr Shaista Faisal said that it has been decided that after January 1st, 2015 no renewal of PM&DC registration certificate will be given without CME/CDE certification as per decided credit point mention on the PMDC website. [www.pmdc.org.pk](http://www.pmdc.org.pk). It is pertinent to mention here that PMDC has decided that all institutions that are included in scheduled III of ordinance are eligible to apply for recognition or their CME/CDE activities which will help doctors to know about new technologies, research and medical education.—APP

Out of these, 11 scholars from Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Balochistan and Gilgit-Baltistan were selected on merit from Government College University, Lahore, Pakistan Institute of Development Economics, Islamabad, University of Peshawar, National University of Modern Languages, Islamabad, Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad and the International Islamic University, Islamabad, respectively.

The selected scholars, who were already enrolled in MPhil programmes, are undertaking research on key subjects which include: federation of Pakistan after 18th Amendment; the political economy of decentralization in Southern Punjab; fiscal federalism in Pakistan and 18th Amendment; the 18th Amendment and development outcomes through local government systems - case study of KPK focusing on decentralization and local government; analysis of 7th NFC with reference to Balochistan; Devolution Plan 2001 and its implications for district bureaucracy; politics of provincial autonomy studying Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and community mobilization. The HEC-UNDP fellowship seeks to fill gaps in the neglected areas of federalism and decentralization through academic research. The fellowship programme has provided an opportunity to scholars to contribute to these topics, opening doors to further in-depth research on federalism.

## DISTRICT NEELUM - EDUCATION PROFILE

Neelum district spreads over the Neelum Valley, which is 144 km long and is bow-shaped, filled with majestic pine, fir and deodar trees. It lies north-south of Muzaffarabad (capital of AJ&K). The valley is divided by the Neelum River which flows in serpentine down hill to merge itself into the river Jhelum at Domail. The geographical features of the Neelum valley enhance the natural attraction of the area. Its elevation, a mere 600 meters at the start, gradually rises till it attains a height of 2,425 meters. On both the sides there are high mountains and peaks. Nearly all the forest wealth of Azad Kashmir is found in this valley. There are two approaches to the valley; one from Kaghan valley and other from Muzaffarabad, the capital of AJ&K<sup>1</sup>.

Education has been a priority of the Govt. of Azad Jammu & Kashmir. Its literacy rate is 70% which is higher than the national average of Pakistan as about 26 % of total recurring budget, besides 08% of total development budget is allocated to education sector. The literacy rate of AJK is 70% which is significantly higher than the national average of Pakistan. Whereas, in district Neelum the literacy rate is 51% which is comparatively lower than other districts of AJK<sup>2</sup>. Following are some highlights on education status in district Neelum;












### Boys/ Girls Schools Enrollment



### Schools Enrollment by level in District Neelum










## THESE CHILDREN JUST WANT TO GO BACK TO SCHOOL

Between government efforts to wipe out insurgents from Pakistan's northern, mountainous regions, and the Taliban's own campaign to exercise power over the Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA), the real victims of this conflict are often invisible. Walking among the rubble of their old homes, or sitting outside makeshift shelters in refugee camps, thousands of children here are growing up without an education, as schools are either bombed by militants or turned into temporary housing for the displaced. Schools have been under attack since 2001, when members of the Taliban fleeing the U.S. invasion of Afghanistan took refuge across the border in neighbouring Pakistan and began to impose their own law over the residents of these northern regions, including issuing a ban on secular schooling on the grounds that it was "un-Islamic". To make matters worse, a military offensive against the Taliban launched on Jun. 18 has forced close to a million civilians to flee their homes in North Waziristan Agency, one of seven districts that comprise FATA, thus disrupting the schooling of thousands of students. Officials here say the situation is very grave, and must be urgently addressed by the proper authorities.

Over the last decade, the Taliban have damaged some 750 schools in FATA, 422 of them dedicated exclusively to girls, depriving about 50 percent of children in the region of an education, says Ishtiaqullah Khan, deputy director of the FATA directorate for education. "We will rebuild them once the military action is complete and the Taliban are defeated," the official tells IPS, though when this will happen remains an unanswered question. Even prior to the latest wave of displacement, FATA recorded one of the lowest primary school enrolment rates in the country, with just 33 percent of school-aged children in classrooms. Girls on the whole fared worse than their male counterparts, with a female enrollment rate of just 25 percent, compared to 42 percent for boys. The period 2007-2013 saw a wave of dropouts, touching 73 percent in 2013, as the Taliban stepped up its activities in the region and families fled in terror to safer areas. All told, some 518,000 primary school students have sat idle over the last decade, Khan said, citing government records. In the Bannu district of the neighbouring Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) province, where most of the displaced from North Waziristan have taken refuge in sprawling IDP camps, the situation is no better.

While the local government struggles to provide basics like food, medicine and shelter, education has fallen on the backburner, and scores of children are losing hope of ever going back to school. Ahmed Ali, a 49-year-old IDP, had hoped that his daughters, aged five, six and seven years, would be enrolled in temporary schools

in the camp in Bannu, but was shattered when he discovered that this was not to be. "I have no way of ensuring their education," he lamented to IPS. A rapid assessment report by the United Nations says that 98.7 percent of displaced girls and 97.9 percent of the boys are not receiving any kind of education in the camps. This is not only exacerbating the woes of the refugees – who are also suffering from a lack of food, dehydration in 42-degree-Celsius heat, diseases caused by inadequate sanitation, and trauma – but it also threatens to upset the school system for locals in the Bannu district, officials say. An existing primary school enrollment rate of just 37 percent (31 percent for girls and 43 percent for boys) is likely to worsen, since 80 percent of some 520,000 IDPs are occupying school buildings. Though schools are currently closed for the summer holiday, the new term is set to begin on Sep. 1. But 45-year-old Hamidullah Wazir, a father of three whose entire family is being housed in a classroom, says few displaced are ready to vacate the premises because they have "no alternatives". He recognises that their refusal to leave could adversely affect education for local boys and girls in Bannu, but "until the government provides us proper shelter, we cannot move out of here," he tells IPS.

Statistics from the department of education indicate there are 1,430 schools in Bannu, of which 48 percent are girls' schools and 1,159 are primary schools. Over 80 percent of these institutions are currently occupied by displaced people, of which some 22,178 (43 percent of occupants) are children. In addition to the IDPs who have flocked here since mid-June, KP is also home to 2.1 million refugees who fled in fear of the Taliban over the last decade. These families, too, have been struggling for years to educate their children. "One whole generation has [missed out] on an education due to the Taliban," Osama Ghazi, a father of four, tells IPS. A shopkeeper by trade, he says that wealthier families moved to KP years ago in search of better opportunities for their families, but not everyone found them. "We have been asking the government to make arrangements for the education of our children but the request is yet to fall on receptive ears," Malik Amanullah Khan, a representative of the displaced people, tells IPS. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Information Minister Mushtaq Ghani says the government is in the process of finding alternatives for displaced children. "We don't want to see these children without an education. They have suffered a great deal at the hands of the Taliban and cannot afford to remain [out of] school any longer," he told IPS, adding that the government, in collaboration with U.N. agencies, aims to provide educational facilities in Bannu free of cost.

## WILL CHANGE IN MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION IMPROVE EDUCATION IN KP?

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government, led by Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf, has changed the medium of instruction in public schools from Urdu to English from April 2014. The arguments put forward for this change in the medium of instruction were to bring public schools at par with private schools in the province and provide uniform education to all the children.

However, it seems that before introducing the drastic step the KP government did not refer to any research or study on the subject to find answers to some key questions like; What is the preferred medium of instruction by parents, students and teachers? What is the impact of change in medium of instruction on educational outcomes e.g. completion of primary education cycle? What does international research on the subject tell us about?

In order to understand the perceptions of stakeholders about their preferred medium of instruction we need to know first about the most commonly spoken languages in KP. According to 1998 Census, 74 per cent population of KP speaks Pashto whereas 3.9 per cent Seraiki, 1 per cent Punjabi, 0.8 per cent Urdu and 20.4 per cent speak other languages. A more recent household survey by Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) 2012 shows that the four commonly used languages in the province are: Pashto (77 per cent), Hindko (11 per cent), Seraiki (3.5 per cent), Chitrali (3 per cent) and others (5.5 per cent).

Now do parents prefer mother tongue as the medium of instruction in schools? Research conducted on the subject in Pakistan and especially in KP shows that parents want their children to be educated in their mother tongue. For instance, one of the recommendations of a British Council Report, 2012, which was based on a case study in KP as well as consultations and policy dialogues at national level, was: "There is evidence that many people are strongly attached to their languages and wish to educate their children through those languages". Another study by the ASER, 2012, which was based on a survey involving 13,702 households in 23 districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, showed that 45 per cent households in KP preferred Pashto as medium of instruction whereas 39 per cent preferred Urdu as the medium of instruction in schools. These surveys indicate that the decision of the KP government to change the medium of instruction to English is not aligned with the demands of the parents and other stakeholders in the province.

Even the primary school students and teachers are opposed to the idea of the government. During a visit to a girls' primary school in Peshawar last year, while collecting research data, it was revealed that a certain school had two female teachers teaching six grade levels (from katchi/pre-primary to grade 5). The only language the teacher could speak was Urdu whereas the students could not understand Urdu as their mother tongue was Pashto. The students of grade 4 and 5, who were sharing the same classroom and being taught by one of the Urdu speaking

teachers, complained that due to the language barrier between them their precious learning time is being wasted.

This means that even if the children are in school they are not learning much that is of value. So if the students have problems in understanding a teacher speaking Urdu, one can imagine how difficult it would be for students to understand their teachers when they are speaking English while everyone is aware that most of the primary school teachers are hardly able to speak a sentence in English.

The second question, which is usually ignored in policy discourse, is about the impact of medium of instruction on children's educational outcomes e.g. their ability to complete primary education cycle (katchi/pre-primary to grade 5). Research on the subject revealed that medium of instruction (Urdu) was negatively associated with primary completion rate during the primary school academic cycle 2007-12 which means that the completion rate decreased by 0.7 per cent during the period as compared to the academic cycle 2002-07. The shift in the policies of the successive governments from Urdu to mother tongue (Pashto) and from mother tongue to Urdu during the two academic cycles is one of the factors in the declining educational outcomes. The decision of the political governments is also manifested in EMIS statistics, for example, the ratio of Urdu versus Pashto medium schools in 2005 was 52:46 which increased to nearly 60:40 after 2007. Hence, the ill-planned policy of the government is increasing the number of out of school children in the province.

Researchers argue that the best medium for early education is the language a child already knows and to which a child is naturally exposed in his/her social environment. Besides, studies also indicate that children, who learn in native languages stay in school longer, do better on tests, and repeat grades less often than students who do not get instruction in familiar language. English is not the medium of instruction even in developed countries like China, Germany, Japan, South Korea, France, etc.

Finally, the government's argument for the change in medium of instruction, that is, to bring public schools at par with private schools in the province, is also shaky and baseless. It is a misconception that just changing the medium of instruction in public schools from Urdu to English will bring them at par with private schools. Many factors such as school resources, curriculum, teachers' motivation, training and accountability, parents' education and socioeconomic status contribute to improving educational outcomes. Simply changing the medium of instruction will achieve nothing unless all these other variables are addressed as well.

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government needs to reconsider its decision and take steps for implementation of the decision of the previous government to embed mother tongue as medium of instruction in primary schools.
